A Year of Successes



Silver winner of the 2007 Association Trends All Media Contest for Scholarly/Technical/Scientific Journals, recent issues of the MRJ have focused on gifted intelligence, the story of q, spatial intelligence, and gifted in the workplace.

"Who is this guy?" was the first thing Mensa member Angela Miller thought upon entering **Professor Patrick Pauken**'s Law, Ethics and Negotiations class at Bowling Green State University. Five years later, Dr. Pauken received the 2007 **Distinguished Teacher Award** based on the strength of her nominating essay.

Dr. Pauken is an associate professor in the School of Leadership and Policy Studies at BGSU,

where he serves as graduate program coordinator of the doctoral program in Leadership Studies.

In her nominating essay, Angela

Miller wrote, "Over the course of the semester, Dr. Pauken challenged me more than any other educator and helped fuel my passion for knowledge, reinvigorate my interest in law, and strengthen my intellectual confidence... Not only was his intellect unparalleled, so were his expectations. I gave what I thought was my best, and he would demand more. Because of his persistence, I produced work of a quality I didn't realize I possessed. The end of the semester came, but it was only the beginning of his tremendous influence."

The Distinguished Teacher Award recognizes a teacher, professor, or instructor at any educational level who has had an especially positive influence on the education or life of a Mensa member. The educators can impact the Mensa member directly or as a result of their influence on the education of a dependent.

The teacher selected for the award is presented with a monetary award from the Mensa Foundation; the school receives a commemorative plaque.

Communication

San Antonio journalist **Karen Adler** has been honored with the 2007 Mensa Press Award. Karen won the \$1,000 award based on her article "Minority Gifted Kids Left Behind" published in the May 27, 2006, *San Antonio Express-News*.

This national award is presented to one individual each year who shows excellence in writing about intelligence and human giftedness in media designed for lay audiences.

"Karen's article spotlighted an issue that is prevalent all over the United States: gifted children of all races and backgrounds not receiving the proper education and challenges they need because their talents haven't yet been identified," said Greg Timmers, president of the Mensa Foundation.

"'Minority Gifted Kids Left Behind' was enlightening, encouraging, and it spread the word about the importance of gifted and talented programs. Because of that, we are proud to honor her with the Mensa Press Award."

Karen left the newspaper in 2006 to become a communications specialist for a school district in the San Antonio area, where she is an advocate for public education. Karen was also named the Texas Association of the Gifted and Talented (TAGT) Advocate of the Year for 2007.

"It's really thrilling to have my work honored by the Mensa Education & Research Foundation," Karen said.

"I stumbled upon this story when I attended a conference for the Texas Association for the Gifted & Talented in San Antonio. I thought, well, now there's an issue that should be



everybody's problem. To receive an award for a story that I gave so much time, effort, and passion to is truly special."

Lifetime Achievement

The Lifetime Achievement Award was presented to **Dr. Jane M. Piirto** of Ashland, OH. With this award for research in the area of human intelligence, especially giftedness, Dr. Piirto received a \$1,000 honorarium and a commemorative plaque and medal. The Lifetime Achievement Award is presented every other year.

"When deciding who should be honored with the Mensa Foundation's Lifetime Achievement Award, we look for someone who has had an incredible impact

on the intellectual community through his or her work in research, theory, or other scholarly areas," Foundation president Greg Timmers said. Dr. Piirto has educated the

public through a long list of publications related to the gifted. Her dedication has extended beyond teaching to investigating how talented individuals learn and, placing such individuals with appropriate experts, effectively translating research into practical benefits for society. We are honored to present Dr. Piirto with this award."

A faculty member at Ashland University since 1988, Dr. Piirto directs AU's Talent Development Education (TDE) program. She teaches graduate courses in the Master of Education (M.Ed.) course of study, qualitative research in the Doctor of Education (Ed.D.) course of study, and undergraduate courses in educational psychology and creativity. She is a consultant and speaker throughout the United States and abroad and has been a teacher and school administrator. Dr. Piirto has written more than 100 published scholarly articles, poems, short stories, and essays.

Intellectual Benefits

The Intellectual Benefits Award for 2007 went to Minneapolis resident **Dr. Deborah Ruf**. The annual award recognizes a Mensa member for the application of intellectual abilities that result in a tangible benefit to society. Dr. Ruf won the award based on her extensive work with gifted children and adults.

Founder of Educational Options, Dr. Ruf offers a number of comprehensive services to her clients including assessment of intelligence, family/ school guidance, college planning, and public speaking. Her goal when she founded the business in 1999 was to help the families of gifted children, particularly highly and profoundly gifted children, to know where to begin their search for answers related to gifted issues.

She has written extensively about gifted children and adults, including her book "Losing Our Minds: Gifted Children Left Behind", and was the

quest editor of the fall 2007 issue of the Mensa Research Journal, which was devoted to the topic of homeschooling.

The Mensa Intellectual Benefits Award was created in 2006 to honor Mensa members who show innovation in activities including education programs for employees, client or business associate education



programs, programs designed to educate the public, and intellectual research and development. These activities may be paid or unpaid with consideration given to the number of individuals impacted by the nominee's contributions.




Creativity

Dr. Harry I. Ringermacher is the 2007 recipient of the **Copper Black Award** for his invention of a flexible imager. The award includes a plaque and \$500 cash. This is Dr. Ringermacher's second time

winning the Copper Black Award.

The judges were very impressed with Dr. Ringermacher's invention of a flexible imager. It uses flexible organic transistors to make a plastic, flexible, digital X-ray panel sensor. Greg Timmers notes, "This was an excellent example of



the creativity that we wanted to spotlight with the Copper Black Award for Creativity."

Dr. Ringermacher received his bachelor's degree and Ph.D. in physics at Washington University in St. Louis, MO. Later, he did a post-doctoral fellowship at NASA's Langley Research Center in Virginia.

As a long-time employee of General Electric (GE), Dr. Ringermacher continues his research in the field of non-destructive evaluation as it relates to aircraft engines and turbine blades. In his spare time he pursues his passion for physics.

After co-hosting the 2006 Mensa Colloquium "Revolution in Cosmology" in October 2006, he also added astrophotography to his list of hobbies.

The Copper Black Award was named after the late Ms. Copper Black, a Mensa member who greatly valued creativity. In her will she left a legacy funding a special annual award to recognize an outstanding creative achievement by a member of American Mensa.

Dr. Ringermacher is the sixth Mensa member to receive this award and the only person to receive it twice.

Eligible research is that first published in or accepted by a peer-reviewed journal, or presented at a peer-reviewed professional conference. 
A 2009 colloquium will examine the past, present, and future of climate change on February 27-March 1 in Atlanta, Georgia.



- Administrative expenses are covered primarily by a grant from American Mensa, Ltd. Donations are used for program expenditures.

The MRJ's mission is to seek and publish current research that addresses the development, measurement, education, preservation, enhancement, or loss of intelligence. Tangential issues or concerns related to cognition or intelligence are also explored.

Mensa Research Journal (MRJ)—Several articles published in the MRJ are authored by members of the international community as are guest columns. To assist in world-wide distribution, postage costs for international subscribers are subsidized so that the yearly subscription rate is the same as for U.S. subscribers.
